

Civic-ready students use civic knowledge, skills, and mindsets to make decisions and take actions for themselves, their communities, and public good as members of a culturally diverse, democratic society. In order to earn the Seal of Civic Readiness, by June of Senior year, high school students must provide evidence in Civic Knowledge and Civic Participation by completing components in the chart below. The seal is earned when students achieve <u>six total points</u> in the criteria below with at least two points on each side (for example, not all points can be earned in Civic Knowledge; a Civic Ready Graduate has a combination of knowledge and skills).

Research Project (1 point)

- Demonstrate civic knowledge through a social studies research project.
- A 10 Grade Enduring Issues Project will be assigned in all 10th Grade courses
- This project must be approved by the District's Seal of Civic Readiness Committee.

The following is the Criteria for Demonstrating Civic Participation:

Civic Skills, Actions, and Mindsets

Complete a High School Civics Project

(1.5 points*)

- Complete a high school civic project that demonstrates civic knowledge, skills, actions and mindsets, as established by the local Seal of Civic Readiness Committee (CRC).
- An 11th Grade Civics Project will be assigned in all 11th Grade courses
- This project must be approved by the District's Seal of Civic Readiness Committee.

Students' Grades on 11th Grade Civics Project in Infinite Campus as Evidence Civic Readiness Committee (CRC) will confirm for reporting purposes These points can be earned more than once, if multiple Civics projects are completed

Civic Experiences I

Complete a Service Learning Project

(1 point*)

- Complete a minimum of **25 hours** of demonstrated service to the community.
- Service learning is an inquiry-based approach that combines service to community with learning objectives. The most meaningful service-learning projects are personally relevant to students and their interests.
 - o Overall Description: <u>Civic Experience I Service Learning Project</u>
 - o Community Issues in Need of Service: **Stay Tuned**
 - Any one or combination of activities for an issue is acceptable; for example on the issue of *poverty*, a service learning project can be
 - (1) 25 hours all at a local food pantry, or
 - (2) 5 hours volunteering for a charity run + 7 hours volunteering at a foodbank + 6 hours working a clothing drive + 7 hours volunteering with a church run toy/diaper drive
- For each 25 hours service project, students can earn 1 point toward the Seal:
 - For the issue (i.e. Poverty) complete one reflection sheet: <u>Service Learning Project Reflection</u>
 <u>AND</u> hours verification forms for all hours completed. (Complete a different sheet for each different organization): <u>Service Learning Verification Form</u>
 [for example (2) above, the student would complete 1 Reflection sheet on the issue of poverty, but would need 4 separate Project Verification sheets].

How Points Awarded:

Students will submit the Reflection and Hours forms to the Civic Readiness Committee. Civic Readiness Committee (CRC) will confirm for reporting purposes.

These points can be earned more than once, if multiple service projects are completed.

Civic Experiences II

Demonstrate proficiency in an elective course that promotes civic engagement

(.5 points*)

- There is power in choice! Throughout high school, students have the opportunity to engage in elective courses that can impact their civic knowledge, skills and mindsets. Many courses, in many different departments, are available to meet this requirement and the list is growing so check back!
- Expectations described with list of already approved Electives: <u>Civic Electives</u>
 - o For **each** qualifying elective course, students must complete:
 - <u>Student Elective Application of Knowledge Form</u> (Reflection)

How Points Awarded:

Students will submit the Student Elective Application of Knowledge Form/Reflection to

the Civic Readiness Committee.

The Civic Readiness Committee (CRC) will confirm for reporting purposes.

These points can be earned more than once.

<u>Civic Experiences III</u>

Participate in an extra-curricular program, or work-based learning experience

(.5 points*)

- Many clubs, groups and responsibilities outside of the school day can shape a student's civic engagement. Students can earn .5 points for each group/club they participate in and complete the reflection sheet. There are many examples that are already approved so check here: <u>Civic Experience III- Extracurricular & Work Study</u>.
 - For *each* qualifying activity / experience, students must complete both:
 - Extra-Curricular / Work Study Verification Form
 - Extra-Curricular / Work Study Reflection Form

How Points Awarded:

Students will submit the Reflection and Verification Sheet(s) to the Civic Readiness

Committee.

Civic Readiness Committee (CRC) will confirm for reporting purposes.

Middle School Capstone Project

(1 point)

- A Civic Readiness Capstone Project is a culminating, experiential, summative project assessing a student's Civic Knowledge, Skills & Actions, and Civic Mindset.
- After the completion of research around a civic issue, students will develop either a service action plan r a detailed action plan:
 - Option A: Service Action Plan Students will develop an action plan that focuses on how individuals can make a difference with the chosen problem or issue.
 - Option B: Detailed Actions Plan Students will develop a detailed action plan that includes analysis of research and data, evaluation of solutions, and recommendations for strategies to support the problem or issue.

High School Capstone Project

(4 points)

- A Civic Readiness Capstone Project is a culminating, experiential, summative project assessing a student's Civic Knowledge, Skills & Actions, and Civic Mindset that will be:
 - Social Studies Standards-based, Locally developed, and Authentic, hands-on, and include real-world investigation and application
- The Capstone Project includes these Essential Elements:
 - o Identify an issue (local, state, national, or global)
 - o Apply civic knowledge, skills, actions, and mindsets to the issue
 - Engage in a civic experience based on the issue to influence positive change to the community (local, state, national, or global)
 - o Present overall project to the school's School Of Civic Readiness Committee
- In a Civic Readiness Capstone project, students will:
 - o Identify a civic issue (problem) facing them, their school, or their community
 - Analyze a civic issue (problem), evaluate alternative solutions, design and/or execute a solution for this problem.
 - o Take informed action to address the civic issue.
 - Reflect on what they have learned about their school or community from the Capstone project.
 - Make a presentation about their Civic Readiness Capstone project
