State Government Primer

Regulations vs. Statutes

- Statutes require approval by Assembly, Senate and Governor
- Regulations require approval by agency governing body
- Regulations cannot supersede statute

Emergency vs. Ordinary Regulations

- Emergency can take effect immediately.
- Both require a comment period before permanent adoption.

The Powers and Duties of School Boards are contained in statute, they cannot be removed by regulation

- <u>§1709</u> Union Free School Districts (example: Jericho)
- §1804 Central School Districts (ex: Syosset)

NYSED Regionalization Initiative

No new authority for District Superintendent (BOCES Superintendent)

Already in law: <u>§2216.14</u>

 "To make such investigations and to make such reports to the commissioner of education upon any matter or act as said commissioner shall from time to time request."

No forced mergers

Controlled by law <u>\$2218</u> <u>Ed.L.</u> (not regulation)

- Requires both BOEs to vote in favor, and...
- Requires 2 affirmative public votes by each affected community (§2218.3.d)

No required participation

"Upon completion of the regional plan, school districts need only pursue implementation of activities they have agreed or consented to for their local context in the final plan."

-- NYSED FAQ

Today's Regents Meeting in Albany

- Regent Roger Tilles (Long Island) asked for amendments to the Regulation that would clarify that no district would be required to participate against their will.
 - NYSED Staff Attorney Daniel Morton Bentley said, "I expect the Department (NYSED) will make a recommendation on that next month." (i.e. December meeting)
 - No Regents spoke in opposition to Regent Tilles' suggestion.
- Current Emergency Regulation <u>cannot</u> be <u>permanently adopted until the</u> <u>January</u> Board of Regents meeting.

Regionalization Recommendations

- Regents should refine regulatory language to be consistent with their messaging:
 - Remove language implying "compel"
 - Make opt-out provision explicit in the regulation
- Regents should clarify:
 - Criteria for "approval" of regional plans
- Plans should highlight
 - Need for State to pay for special education services until age 22
 - Need for State to approve more preschool special education seats
 - Need for State to develop more in-patient & out-patient mental health supports for students
- Our "red line"?
 - No loss of local control
 - No compulsory participation in regional plans
