Syosset CSD Early Grade Transitions UPK to K Grade 5 to Grade 6



- Each elementary school sends a letter of welcome to incoming Kindergarten families
- Students and families attend an orientation where a tour of the school is given
- Students with IEPs have a transition CPSE to CSE meeting where families learn about special education supports at the elementary school
- Students participate in Kindergarten screening where they meet with the following professionals:
 - Kindergarten Teachers
 - Occupational Therapists
 - Speech Therapists
 - \circ ENL Teachers

Success for All Students

- Articulation meeting with the Directors/Principals of each **UPK** site
- Parent conferences in UPK to support transition ullet
- Ongoing communication with families which includes letters ulletfrom elementary schools with reference information about transitioning to Kindergarten
- CPSE to CSE Parent orientation meeting to discuss the continuum of services in elementary school
- Cumulative transition folders for Kindergarten teachers that include:
 - Student achievement in UPK progress reports, universal screening information
 - Learning samples academic acquisition Ο
 - Handwriting sample measurement of fine motor skills Ο
 - Any other pertinent information Ο



UPK to Kindergarten Transition

- Each middle school sends communications to families regarding the transition including:
 - General welcome & information
 - Information about course selection & schedules
 - $\,\circ\,\,$ Invitation to parent orientation in the spring
- In the spring, fifth graders visit each middle school to tour the buildings
- Peer leaders present to the fifth graders about middle school life and students get a sneak peek into a middle school classroom
- In August, incoming 6th graders attend an optional orientation where they practice reading a schedule and tour the building again
- During August orientation, students get to know each other during ice-breaker activities







Success for All Students

- Guidance counselors collaborate with fifth-grade teachers to ulletgain insights about students' achievements
- Communication with families is ongoing to support students' • transition
- Elementary and middle school reading and math specialists • collaborate to ensure students receive the support they may need to succeed.
- Middle school special education administration and/or • support staff attend the CSE meeting in the spring to help build the 6th grade IEP






Syosset CSD Grade 8 to Grade 9 Transition

78% 76% 74% 72% 70% 68% 66% 64%




Proportion of 9th grade students taking at least 1 honors course

Success for All Students

Building a well-balanced & rigorous high school experience

- Workshops across multiple subject areas
- Extra help offered multiple times each week, including scheduling individual appointments as needed
- Timely communication with parents
- All courses provide required IEP and 504 accommodations for success.
- The MTSS framework offers tiered academic and behavioral interventions to meet diverse learning needs (see <u>MTSS BOE presentation</u>)
- Mental health and well-being is prioritized with available support through guidance counselors, social workers and psychologist



8th to 9th Grade Transition

Building a well-balanced & rigorous high school experience

The District continually strengthens its transition planning process for 8th grade students entering high school to better inform and empower students & families about:

- Program choices \bullet
- Long-range high school planning
- Balancing the wide range of opportunities •
- Fostering student's ability to know how and when to seek • additional academic and emotional support.

In-District Field Trip

8th graders will visit the high school to learn about the 9th grade elective opportunities while meeting with current high school students (January 7,9,14, & 15)

9th Grade-specific Curriculum Guide

Review of the orientation <u>E- Book</u> & 9th grade curriculum guide with middle school PTSA (January 8th)

Elective Flexibility

9th grade Peer Education classes move from a full year course to an alternate day course increasing elective choice and flexibility.

Naviance Expansion

8th Grade students will use Naviance (currently used in High School) to develop skills awareness that will promote inform program choices. (December)


